I wish all our families a safe and happy holiday break and we will see our students back at school on Tuesday 30th April.



A medical certificate is required for sick leave of more than 3 days.

If going away for more than 5 days families will need to apply for Extended Leave and provide evidence eg flight booking

MOBILE PHONE POUCHES

9 April 2024

Due to the Coffs Harbour bypass roadworks, commencing 15 April 2024 vehicles will no longer be able to turn right from the M1 Pacific Highway onto Solitary Islands Way at Korora.

This will affect the Northbound bus stops along Solitary Islands Way. The four stops that will not be serviced during the closure are:

- 2450603 Bus Stop Solitary Islands Way opposite Oceanfront Drive Korora
- 2450600 Bus Stop Solitary Islands Way opposite 44 Korora
- 2450341 Bus Stop Solitary Islands Way opposite Headland Road
- 2450687 Bus Stop Solitary Islands Way before Split Solitary Road

Students who would normally board or alight at these stops will now need to do so at bus stop 24506 – Solitary Islands Way after Gaudrons Road. The routes 393, S833 and S954 will be diverted via M1 Pacific Highway to Sapphire Beach exit. Southbound services will not be impacted at this stage.

Please see below a map which shows the bus stops that will no longer be serviced and the stop they will now need to catch the bus. Further information will be updated on Travel NSW trip planner prior to the 15 April 2024.

Senior Excursion

YEAR 9 - AGRICULTURE

This week Year 9 students started their Plant Production Unit by planting their crops of Russian garlic (also known as Elephant Garlic). Just under 2000 cloves were planted between 2 classes who are expecting to harvest and process their crops in November this year.

From this point the classes will need to manage for pests, nutrition, monitor growth and overall plant health to produce a marketable product.

Completing with the high rainfall prior to planting both classes worked through muddy conditions to be planted before ANZAC Day.

YEAR 10 - GEOGRAPHY FIELD TRIP

Year 10 recently headed off on a field trip to Woolgoolga Beach, where they delved into the dynamics of our coastal environment. Led by our dedicated HSIE teachers, they examined both human and natural impacts on the picturesque coastline.

One of the key phenomena they explored was erosion and deposition—the constant reshaping of the coastline by natural forces. They learned how powerful waves and currents sculpt the land over time. Erosion was evident in the eroded cliffs and exposed rock formations, while areas of deposition showcased how sand and sediment accumulate along the shoreline.

They learned about constructive waves, which gently deposit sand and build up the beach, the reason why we can't see Buster at the moment, and destructive waves, which erode the coastline by dragging sand away. Witnessing these waves firsthand helped us appreciate their role in shaping our coastal landscapes.

They also examined the human impact on Woolgoolga Beach. Sadly, litter was a visible issue along certain parts of the coastline. It was a stark reminder of the importance of responsible waste disposal and the detrimental effects of plastic pollution on our oceans and marine life.

During our trip, they engaged in valuable discussions about coastal management strategies. We learned about efforts to mitigate erosion, such as beach nourishment and the use of seawalls. We also discussed the importance of community involvement in coastal conservation and the need for sustainable practices to protect our fragile coastal ecosystems.

Our time at Woolgoolga Beach was not just an educational outing; it was a call to action for the students who were inspired to become stewards of our environment, advocating for responsible coastal management and raising awareness about the impacts of human activities on our precious natural habitats.

A heartfelt thank you to Mr West for organizing this field trip, Year 10 HSIE teachers (current and retired) for executing the field trip, and to all the year 10 students for their enthusiasm and engagement throughout the day.

Educational Pathways Program



The Educational Pathways Program (EPP) will continue at Woolgoolga High School this year, following its success at our school since 2020. It is an innovative careers program designed to improve higher education and career outcomes for students. Woolgoolga High School was lucky to be chosen as one of four schools to run the pilot program in 2020 within the Grafton School Group including Maclean High School, Grafton High School and South Grafton High School. The program features 8 initiatives including Innovative Careers Education (Careers events, parent & industry engagement), Enhancing School Based Apprenticeship and Traineeship Opportunities (SBAT), a TAFE NSW Early School Leavers program (assisting school leavers under 17 to transition to a TAFE course), Back in the Game program (a referral service to support students to transition to Vocational Education and Training (VET) and employment), Job Readiness Workshops, TAFE NSW 'Start Your Future' program (TAFE taster courses across a range of different industries), Educational Pathways VET Ambassadors (Guest speakers discussing VET career pathways), and an Apprenticeship & Traineeship Head Start program (Group Training Organisations offering fee-free pre-apprenticeship courses to students).

The program is being led again this year by EPP Head Teacher Careers Mr David Youman, with the assistance of our school Careers Advisor Ms Chris Hansen, Transition Adviser Ms Dani Canakis, SBAT Engagement Officer Ms Rachel Copeland and EPP School Administrative Officer Ms Emma Darbin who can be contacted at any time in the school Library Office.
