This initiative is a partnership between Woolgoolga High School, Coffs Harbour City Council, Woolgoolga Chamber of Commerce and HR Works run by (the president of the Chamber Commerce) Cherie Topfer.

More information about this program will be given to our Year 9 students during assembly on Monday. This is an amazing opportunity to be mentored by local business people and successful professionals that live in our community. Students will learn real life business skills and I am sure will encourage the participants to want to achieve in the last three years of their education. Motivational programs like this one can improve HSC results significantly, especially when students have a clear focus on wanting to be successful from the beginning of Year 10.

**Ashley Wake's** Major Textiles Project (MTP), a contemporary dress, has been selected for inclusion in Textstyle, the annual exhibition of Outstanding MTPs developed by HSC Textiles and Design students from across NSW. Ashley's design in the category of special occasion wear was inspired by hydrangeas, embroidery and Jenny Lohs a contemporary designer. According to Ashley, *"the elegant garment is reflective of the designs in contemporary society such as elegant flowing skirts and feminine plunging necklines."* Ashley says *"originally she would not have thought to incorporate hydrangeas into her design, but after hearing a local guest textile artist Jenny Lohs speak, she was inspired by her pieces that used an array of textures and techniques to create natural shapes"*.



**Jasmine Hovermann's** Major Textile Project (MTP), a contemporary dress and headpiece, has also been selected for the inclusion in the prestigious annual TEXSTYLE exhibition. Jasmine's apparel item also fell into the category of special occasion wear. Jasmine's design was inspired by floral gardens and contemporary designers Chotronette, Elie Saab and Nicholas Kniel. Their designs are luxurious, feminine and incorporate floral embellishments. She explains that her garment *"is reflective of the changing contemporary society in which we live, as it demonstrates the change in technology used in the textiles industry today, such as free machine embroidery, advanced fabrics and a change in style and design development."*



# EDUCATION FOR A CHANGING WORLD

Artificial Intelligence and robots are going to play a big role in our kids' future.

As parents and teachers, we are concerned about how to best prepare our kids for that future. What jobs will they have? What jobs will disappear? What new opportunities will be created? What do we need to teach our kids so that they're ready to take advantage of all these things?

These were the themes of the Education for a Changing World symposium run by the Department of Education in Sydney earlier this month.


Mr Chris Young from the mathematics faculty attended from Woolgoolga High School.

The speakers and panel members at the symposium were experts in their fields from around the world; the head of Microsoft for the Asia Pacific, the Chair of the Board of the Commonwealth Bank, the Commodore in charge of the Australian Navy Air Wing, leading academics and business entrepreneurs.

## What did we learn?

Nobody can predict the future accurately and, with the present changing as fast as it is, that task is more difficult than it ever has been. However, here is some of the best advice from the best minds:

1. Teach our kids to solve problems. Jobs that involve doing the same things over and over again are most at risk of being replaced by computers and robots. What computers and robots can't do is solve new problems.



Kids who can use what they learn at school, learn at home and learn in the wider world to solve real world problems are most likely to find rewarding careers

2. Teach our kids empathy. An AI algorithm can suggest the next song you might like to listen to on YouTube but it can't feel what you feel when you listen to it. Jobs that require interpersonal relationships, an understanding of other people's feelings and states of mind are least likely to be replaced by robots and computers. Teachers, carers, counsellors, nurses etc.

3. Teach our kids programmatic thinking. There is an almost insatiable demand for professionals that can develop and implement algorithms and code. This demand is unlikely to decline in the near future.

4. Encourage our kids to be resilient and flexible. They will need to keep learning throughout their lives. The world that they will live in as adults will be very different from the world we live in now. It is likely that our kids will be the last generation that learns to drive a car (self-driving cars are available now). They will need to learn new skills and adapt to new realities throughout their lives. They should expect that education will not stop when they finish school, it will not stop when they finish university or TAFE - it will be something that they need to do throughout their working lives.

Some people in our community are not so fortunate and feel more alone and vulnerable at this time of year. It's an incredibly difficult time for the homeless, especially women; including teenage girls, and those women fleeing domestic violence.

Woolgoolga High School's Senior Community and Family Studies class showed some love and support to those less fortunate and provided them with the dignity of knowing someone understands and cares for them.

As a society, we seem to manage the needs of children at Christmas, ensuring they're cared for and made to feel special, but the same can't always be said for those women who put the needs of others before their own or those who are less fortunate.

Maths is everywhere. Maths is enjoyable. Maths helps us understand our world.




These are the lessons that students in the 2017 Year 7 Extension Maths program have learned.


