OVERWINTERING PROJECT ART EXCURSION TO MOONEE RESERVE

Our Year 9 Visual Arts students have been selected to be involved in an art project in conjunction with the Coffs Harbour Regional Art Gallery. The Overwintering Project involves our students creating a lino print with the theme Shorebirds and the impacts of our society on their numbers, migration and habitat. Organised by Jo Beasley, the Overwintering Project is a multidisciplinary, environmental art project that brings together artists, local high schools, scientists, birders and poets to address environmental impacts on migratory shorebirds and their habitats, including special places here on the Coffs coast.

Each student will create a lino block based on this theme. The lino blocks are carved and tested at school then on 23 November, our students will be printing them on large format paper at the Jetty using a steamroller. Please come and have a look at this event; I believe this is the first time a steamroller has been used to print in Australia. The prints created will be included in the Coffs Harbour Regional Gallery's Overwintering Project Exhibition from 6 December 2019 through to 8 February 2020.

Super Saturday is the last phase in the process whereby students apply to get into the Excel class (7Red) for 2020. Students put together an extensive portfolio and their teachers provide a written reference outlining their achievements at primary school. One student applied from Lord Howe Island. Our Excel class is indeed a sought after class!

It is fantastic that our Year 9 Visual Art students are working with the Coffs Harbour Regional Art Gallery in the Overwintering Project. I am really looking forward to watching the steam roller squash the lino blocks (see front page for more details). Great work to Jacqui Harrison and her team.

The Community project initiative is helping community members with work around their houses. A big thank you to Kim Beedie and Blake Cusack for creating this amazing initiative.

Uncle Mark Flanders started the day off with a welcome to country. He then worked with small groups taking them on a cultural walk of the area explaining many of the significant features of the Moonee Beach Reserve landscape. We even got to try some bush tucker!

Andrew Turbill from National Parks and Wildlife spoke to students about the Shorebirds and their habitat. The students had first-hand experience in what it might feel like as a predator or prey in a blind folded game. The students had a great time playing this and did very well finding their 'prey' or avoiding the 'predator' without the benefit of sight.

The Art Gallery organised artists Sara Bowden, JP Willis and Jo Elliott to be involved with the project and will be Artists in Residence at the school over the next six weeks. Sitting on the Moonee headland, students created artistic responses to birds and habitats, sketched and composed drawings with thick markers, in preparation for their lino carving designs.

We were fortunate to have John Bennett and other members of BirdLife NSW share their knowledge with our students. They looked for Shorebirds, talked about birdwatching, created some poetry and photographed the bird life. Many students had never really been involved in this type of activity and found it rewarding and interesting.

Students were treated to a BBQ lunch compliments of the Gallery and other involved agencies. It was a fantastic day for our students. Many learnt a lot about our local environment and had a great deal of fun with the activities organised for us. Thank you to our Coffs Harbour Regional Gallery for making this opportunity possible.

THE CLASS OF 2020

Welcome to the final 12 months of high school! This can be an anxious and uncertain time but also an exciting and rewarding time of your life. Make sure that you maintain a balanced approach to health, fitness, family, friends, socialising, work and of course plenty of study. Planning, preparing and practicing exam-style questions throughout the HSC year will be of great benefit.

HSC Assessment Schedule Booklets will soon be distributed to students. They provide the timing and weightings of assessment tasks for each subject. Students will need to sign an assessment task register at least two weeks prior to sitting a HSC assessment task. It is very important that students are organised, know the dates of assessment tasks and prepare for each task.

Students were issued with a HSC Rules and Procedures **NESA Booklet**. It provides information about completing their HSC exams including obeying HSC All My Own Work, qualifying for a HSC, bringing the correct equipment, following exam room procedures and understanding misadventures.

School reports for the Preliminary courses are scheduled to be handed out on Friday 15 November. This will provide a clear indication of their result in the Preliminary yearly exams, rank and also their overall assessment rank in each subject.

Subjects cannot be dropped until all requirements of the Preliminary courses have been met. After receiving reports, some students may choose to reduce their academic workload by unenrolling in a subject. Subject changes need to be completed by Mr Oates. Many students will choose to maintain at least 12 units into the HSC, which will enable a greater diversity of options in courses and units that could be included in determining their ATAR.

As another form of communication a **Google Class-room** has been set-up. The code is 5uzyhl0 (the last characters are lower case L and then the number zero). This may assist students, parents and caregivers to have input into the final year of school and can also get information as needed. You will also need to upload a baby photo to the classroom for your final Year 12 assembly next year.

Reduce Risk - Increase Student Knowledge (RRISK) is on Thursday 7 November at Southern Cross University, Coffs Harbour. The cost is free. Students are required to wear full school uniform. Travel will be by bus from Woolgoolga High School. RRISK is a health promotion initiative that addresses risk-taking behaviour amongst Year 11 students. Adolescent risk taking associated with alcohol, drugs, driving and celebrating results in unacceptably high levels of injury and trauma. The program assists to develop knowledge, attitudes and skills to encourage safe risk taking behaviour. RRISK is a compulsory activity in the senior curriculum for Year 11 students. Students will regularly say that they do not know what to do at home or how to study. Here's some ideas that could help.

- Set-up a study space that reduces distractions (no mobile phone).
- Develop a study timetable that allocates time to each subject throughout the week.
- Use a wall planner.
- Pre-read the recommended textbooks.
- Watch Atomi videos.
- Regularly read over course notes.
- Create summaries for each subject (which could be dot points, flash cards, graphic organisers, posters or audio recordings).
- Submit draft responses.
- · Complete more exam-style questions.

The **Academic Achievement Centre** is available for students on Tuesday mornings, Wednesday during sport time and after school on Thursdays. Members of staff are present to assist students with their school work and assignments.

Students should have collected a **Staying on Track** note. It is very important that students organise a Staying on Track teacher so that you can get a personalised school reference next year. This is an awesome wellbeing initiative that will assist students to maximise results in the HSC.

There are always lots of commitments in the last year of school. Allocate as much time as you can towards your study. I haven't ever heard anyone say they wish they had studied less. If you put the time and effort into your school work, you will reap the rewards of higher results. This will almost certainly lead to a better quality of life into the future. Enjoy the year ahead!

Woolgoolga High School's partnership with Atomi continues due to past success

Behavioural Interventions and Water Stations in Regional Secondary Schools

Our school has agreed to participate in a research study which is exploring ways to promote and increase water consumption and decrease sugar sweetened beverage consumption in Year 7 students.

We know that childhood overweight and obesity is a significant problem and has negative health effects on children both in the short and long-term. We also know that consuming sugary drinks such as soft drink, sports drinks, energy drinks and juices contributes to this. Therefore, this is an important study to determine how we can encourage children to drink more water.

We will be inviting all Year 7 students to participate in a survey. This will allow us to determine which factors are most important in promoting water as a preferred drink. The surveys will be completed in your child's PDHPE class time and will take about 10 minutes.



Dear Year 8 Parent or Carer

The *Validation of Assessment for learning* & *Individual Development* (VALID) test for Year 8 students will be held between Monday 28 October and Friday 8 November 2019. The test takes approximately 70 minutes. The *VALID Science* 8 test is an interactive, multimedia test completed entirely on a computer.

VALID Science 8 contains multiple choice, short response and extended response tasks that are grouped around real-world issues, including scientific investigations. This is a diagnostic test, with tasks framed on Stage 4 outcomes and essential content in the NSW *Science Years K-10 Syllabus*. Students will be tested on their:

- knowledge and understanding of science
- understanding and skills in the process of scientific investigation
- ability to evaluate evidence, make judgements and think critically
- ability to access information and communicate scientific ideas.

Students also complete a survey about their opinions, attitudes and values about science.

Since students complete *VALID Science 8* on a computer, each student needs to bring **headphones or earbuds** that plug into a school computer. Earbuds for an iPod or portable player are suitable.

If your child has a disability that needs special consideration or has been educated in English for less than one year, please contact your child's school to discuss special provisions or possible exemption from the test.

Results of the test will be available during Term 1 2020. Information about each student is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that the right to privacy of all students is maintained. A personal report for each student will be sent to parents/carers to describe the science knowledge and skills demonstrated by the student in the test. There will also be information about how your child's results compare with overall performance of all students in the test.

The principal of your child's school is able to provide you with more details about the VALID program if you require additional information.


Parent Online Payment (pop)
