Last Friday was **World Teachers Day**. I would like to acknowledge the expertise and excellent work our teachers do with our students every day. Thank you.

As I have previously mentioned, we will be proceeding with text messages advising parents and carers if their child has truanted a lesson. If you receive a text and believe it is incorrect, please let us know. Note that this is in addition to the morning text advising of a whole day absence, it does not replace this text.

While mobile phones can be a very useful learning tool, we are finding they have a negative impact in many classrooms as both a distraction from learning and a source of conflict when a teacher asks for a student's phone. As a school we are investigating the use of **Yondr pouches**. Several schools in our area are using them and we are engaging in consultation to see how they could work here. You can easily find out about them online. We will discuss them at next week's P&C meeting, alternatively, please email the school if you would like to provide feedback.

Kim Beedie hosted *Super Saturday* on the 24th October. This is the last big step for students in the selection process to be considered for the Excel Class, Year 7 2021. The toothpick STEM activity was

particularly challenging. Congratulations to the students for their excellent participation and thank you Ms Beedie and her team for their preparation and smooth running of the day.

Every fortnight we have a group of Year 6 students from our partner primary schools come to WHS for our *High School Headstart* Mathematics program. This is done in conjunction with the Mathematics Growth Team that Ms Winter works with. I was fortunate enough to spend some time with them this week. 

Work begins on \$23.1 million Woolgoolga Sports Complex right opposite our School!



The ground was broken on Tuesday 3 November on the \$23.1m West Woolgoolga Sports Complex by Federal Member for Page Kevin Hogan MP, State Member for Coffs Harbour Gurmesh Singh MP and Coffs Harbour Mayor Councillor Denise Knight. The project vision for West Woolgoolga Sports Complex is to deliver an inclusive, vibrant and healthy community space for locals and visitors to gather, play, compete, practice, learn, perform and celebrate. This facility will provide plenty of accessible opportunities for our school community such as: playing fields - to cater to AFL, cricket, with tournament overlay for touch football as well as multi use fields. The multi purpose centre comprises of two indoor courts (basketball and netball), stage, kitchen, multi purpose rooms and amenities. These facilities will offer a great alternative for our Wednesday School Sport program and for practical PE lessons.

TAFE NSW YES+ PROGRAM

The TAFE NSW Youth Engagement Strategy PLUS (YES+) **TAFE Tasters** program commenced on Tuesday, 20 October with 25 students participating. The program runs one day per week for six weeks at Coffs Harbour TAFE. Students are participating in a variety of courses including Plumbing, Carpentry, Bricklaying, and Pottery at the Glenreagh Street campus, and Animal Studies, Automotive, Hair and Beauty, Barista, and Early Childhood courses at CHEC.

Students at both campuses have been following rigorous COVID safety procedures, and I have been very impressed with the level of care and welfare shown to our students by the staff at TAFE. Our students were a little overawed and a bit nervous, especially at CHEC, but settled in quickly. All the students that I have contacted have been very positive about their experience.

The Yes+ Program helps students engage with learning in a handson environment as students get to engage in vocational taster courses. The program gets students out of the school setting into TAFEstyle learning and is an innovative opportunity for them to test different job options while still at school. The TAFE Tasters program is funded by the NSW Department of Education Educational Pathways Pilot Program (EPPP), operating at Woolgoolga High School.

EPPP Student Pre-survey

Year 10 students have been undertaking an online computer pre-survey this week of the school's Educational Pathway Pilot Program (EPPP) programs that they have been involved in at the school. The NSW Department of Education has developed 10 EPPP pilot programs aimed at improving career development

services, vocational education and training pathways, and future employment outcomes for students. Student responses from the survey will be collated by a research team at Western Sydney University and will be used to inform the future improvement and expansion of the EPPP program.

Woolgoolga High School is one of 4 schools in the Coffs Harbour and Clarence Valley local government areas offering the EPPP program, a NSW Department of Education led initiative to improve career pathways and future employment outcomes for young people.

Episode 6 of **EPPP TV** is now available for viewing by students and parents.

In this episode, the EPPP TV head back to the NSW North Coast to explore opportunities in **Hospitality and Tourism**:

This episode sees host and heavy vehicle mechanic, Liam Muldoon, travel to Alstonville outside Ballina to meet a manager who's investing in local youth. Christian Photiou from The Trident Fish and Grill has two school-based trainees (SBATS) from Alstonville High School on the books, and we hear what Blake and Chelsea have to say about their traineeships. NEWCASTLE University is offering a new one-year Diploma in Engineering program during 2021 for students completing their HSC. Students undertaking the new diploma will receive up to 80 units of credit towards an undergraduate degree and guaranteed entry into all disciplines of the Bachelor of Engineering (Honours) degree. The Diploma will provide students with a taste of two discipline areas within the university's 12 engineering specialisations, and prepare them with the appropriate academic literacy, research, science, mathematics and introductory engineering skills required for further study. It would be a great stepping stone for those students interested in Engineering, but who may not get the required ATAR marks for direct entry into an Engineering program. - Ensure physical distancing is maintained. Maintain a 1.5m distance from people that are not sitting at your table


Parent Online Payment (pop)
