

CUTTING EDGE MACHINERY



The TAS department at Woolgoolga High School has been incredibly fortunate to have cutting edge machinery for our students to access. The recent sublimation printer and heat press will enable our students to create their own swimwear fabric. There are endless uses for this machine such as printing neoprene for wetsuit tops, ipad covers, fabric for outdoor cushions, printing on polyester fabric to create fabric for uses such as corsets, dresses and bags. This machine can also print onto mugs, drink bottles, metal and ceramics.

A cricut machine which can cut up to 300 types of materials, from silk to balsa wood has also recently been acquired. Senior students will be using it to cut and emboss faux leather while juniors will be accessing and learning how to use this new technology to create and label various items such as t-shirts, key tags and bags just to name a few. Hospitality students will be able to create their own menus to industry standards.

A fantastic opportunity for our students to have access to this technology which is commonly used only in metropolitan schools. Mrs Fluechter

Our Annual Presentation Assembly (APA) will again have a different format this year. We are required to have one year group at a time with the ceremonies to be conducted outdoors. We will set up the COLA for these special assemblies. Unfortunately, we are not permitted to have parents on-site attending these presentations, but we will work on a format for sharing with parents online.

Monday 13 December – Year 9 and Year 10

Tuesday 14 December – Year 7, Year 8 and Year 11

As you will see later in this edition, we had OneMob Radio streaming their breakfast show live from the school last Thursday. It really gave us a positive atmosphere and was a wonderful way to start the day. I look forward to having them here again.

NOTICE

STUDENTS THAT LEAVE A NSW PUBLIC SCHOOL

While a student is enrolled in a NSW Public School, they are allocated user credentials that provide them with access to email, student portal, Google G Suite, Microsoft Office 365 and Adobe Creative Cloud. They can access these services for free, both while at school and from home - *or anywhere else. BUT WHAT HAPPENS WHEN THEY LEAVE?*

Students need to be informed that from the date they leave a NSW Public School - i.e. *when the school has marked them as a Leaver in ERN* - they have 180 days before they lose access to:

- Their school email account (GMail)
- Their Google Drive contents
- Any Google Classrooms they were joined to
- Their Microsoft OneDrive contents
- Any Microsoft Teams they were a member of
- Their access to Adobe Creative Cloud

So from the time that they leave, they have 180 days to check all their content/files in these school-provided services and download anything that they need to keep. There is no need to delete what they do not wish to keep. Anything left in their cloud repositories after the 180 days will no longer be accessible to them.



The following is a list of items which are not permitted to be brought to Woolgoolga HS

- cigarette lighters
- knives of any kind
- tobacco or related products
- vapes/ e-cigarettes
- energy drinks
- water balloons/bombs
- alcohol
- glass containers/bottles
- chewing gum
- any weapons or ammunition eg sling shot

Ag Farm



In April this year, the **Year 9** Agriculture class planted 25kg of garlic as part of their plant production unit. Throughout this unit they have studied horticultural practices which include analysing soil texture and pH, planting techniques and pest and disease management. Last week the students harvested it with the assistance of the **Year 10** Agriculture class and some of the **Year 8** Mandatory Technology students.

The yield appears to be bountiful, and it is currently hanging as it undergoes the drying process. While the garlic is drying the students are developing strategies to market the garlic as they investigate some of the business methods involved in the industry.



Students have developed many skills throughout this unit and look forward to bringing home some garlic to use in family meals.



Kade said he is enjoying working on the building sites.

"A big part of it is the blokes around you that make it enjoyable, they are all willing to teach you something new, whether it's framing or whatever," Kade said.

Kade encouraged other students thinking about undertaking a School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship to give it a go.

"Do it for sure, it gives you a head start," Kade said.

"If you are in two minds like me about finishing school, it gives you the opportunity to finish school and make some money."



Year 11 student Kade Levingston has commenced a School Based Apprenticeship (SBAT) with Woolgoolga building company M5 Building & Co. Kade undertook Year 10 work experience with the building company and volunteered to work with the business during the last school holidays. This initiative, combined with Kade's participation in the Educational Pathways Pilot Program (EPPP) at our school, including the popular EDGE Workshop and the EPPP Novaskill Construction Pre-Apprenticeship program at Grafton, have all contributed to Kade's success in landing the SBAT. Kade is now working one day a week with Luke McCluskey of M5 Building & Co labouring on various local building sites, and from 2022 will commence one day a week of TAFE studies combined with three days of school to complete his HSC. Pre-traineeship Business Skills Course

Current Year 10 and 11 students have until Tuesday 30 November to register their interest to participate in a free Pre-traineeship Skills Course in Business (Customer Service) which will run in Term 1, 2022. The course will be great for students interested in pursuing a career in Business, Administration or Customer Service. The course is being offered for free by the Educational Pathways Pilot Program (EPPP) operating at our school and will be run at Woolgoolga by Novaskill. The course will run over 6 days during school hours from Mondays to Wednesdays over a twoweek period, followed by one week of student work placement. Students will obtain Units of Competency in the following areas:

- Deliver and monitor a service to customers
- Process customer complaints
- Design and produce business documents
- Apply critical thinking skills in a team

A free The EDGE (Education, Deportment, Grooming, Employability Skills) Webinar is being offered to students on Wednesday 8 December. The EDGE Webinar will give students the EDGE when starting out in the workforce. This free webinar will provide you and your child with:

- Localised information on what industries employ young people in your area
- What local employers are looking for in job applicants
- How to communicate with employers
- How to present the best version of yourself for an interview

Our school has run The EDGE Workshops at school in 2021 and 2020 which saw students learn how to apply skincare products and look after their skin, and learn how to apply natural makeup, style their hair and how to dress appropriately for a job interview, as well as learning the importance of having a good social media account. YEAR 11 INTO YEAR 12 STUDY GROUPS & TIPS

Ancient History

Structure study notes around the Syllabus Dot Points, break each dot point down into simple ideas that can be elaborated on individually. Update the notes regularly.

Add sources, for example:

Practice extended response questions - refer to NESA exam workbooks. Students can unpack top responses to past papers

Paragraph writing:

Topic Sentence Explanation sentences Evidence from sources Analysis of sources Synthesis sentence Linking/Concluding sentence

Information Processes and Technology

Check Google classrooms each lesson for worksheets, class notes, videos, images and web links. Do your pre reading from the textbook. Do the end of section and end of chapter questions ON PAPER,(DO your Homework.) not using a text processor (love the irony) that means writing the answers out as you will sit a 3 hr written exam for the HSC.. Hand your homework to the teacher to mark. Ask questions in class. Focus on the topic in class because you will learn more about the subject from your teacher than from Google. Read the Syllabus. Highlight parts you are unsure of after the topic is covered during class. Start a "main points" revision sheet. Talk to your parents about what you learned in class. Explain the topic to them. If you cannot explain the topic, you have not learned it.

PHYSICS

- Complete Success One past exam questions
- Complete KISS notes
- Watch Atomi videos and complete the questions
- Complete Moodle quizzes
- Construct a summary for each module. Use a format that works for you. E.g. audio notes, posters, mind-maps or dot points

Modern History

Looking at sample essays/responses from the NESA exam workbooks - this is relevant to all subjects. These are top band samples that students can unpack to see what makes this a top response and what they could learn and use from it in their own responses.

Core Study and Nuclear Age - Remember these are a mix of long and short answer questions. How do you practice this? Past papers, past papers and more past papers!

National and Conflict Studies - Essays! Brush up on your essay writing by following some advice below: Language

Never EVER write in first person - this is the cardinal sin of modern essay writing. Markers hate this and you will lose marks if you use first person.

Also, always use formal language and avoid colloquialisms. Whilst most people know this, some colloquialisms are difficult to pick up on. For example, the word "things" as in "Hence, these things demonstrate that...." is an example of colloquial language.

Arguments

Don't make your arguments emotional or personal. HSC markers will not respond to bleeding heart essays. They respond to logical analysis supported by fact and historiography.

The holy grail of essay writing is balancing clarity and simplicity with a sophisticated argument. An argument which has great depth and complexity is much easier to understand if you write it clearly and in a well organised and structured manner. You don't want the marker to have to read over your paragraphs a few times because your argument isn't clear.

Practice

With essays, practice makes perfect. Writing practice essays can greatly help improve your essay writing skills. Whilst it may seem obvious, having them marked is of vital importance, as the feedback is what helps you identify areas in need of improvement. Writing an essay and not having it marked is near useless
