### COMMERCE AND LEGAL STUDIES COURTHOUSE EXCURSION

On the 11th of August, Woolgoolga High Commerce and Legal Studies students, along with Mr West and Mrs March, embarked on a journey to the Coffs Harbour Courthouse and Police Station. Students have been learning in class about the Australian legal system and the roles played by the courts, so this excursion was a great opportunity to see the law in action.

Arriving at the Courthouse, students were separated into two groups. Each group went into a local courtroom and witnessed a number of trials. Students had the opportunity to see those in custody from the previous day being charged with minor crimes. There were also people who had already pled guilty, coming in to receive their sentence. It was interesting to see how the lawyers and the magistrate work in person.

In the police station, students were taken to a room where they met a Youth Officer and Aboriginal Community Liaison Officer. After the meeting, the lovely youth officer took us down to the forensic lab. There we met an officer who took us through the rooms where everything is processed. We were lucky to be allowed to enter one room, where he turned the lights off to show us how the black light works in order to detect clues at a crime scene. The black light can even spot stains that have been "cleaned".

Students then went outside to the carpark to meet some officers from highway patrol, and we were lucky enough to sit inside some of their cars to see how everything works. Unfortunately, once the tour of the station was over, so was our trip. Overall the excursion was a fun and educational experience, which I would recommend to students if they get a chance.

#### <u>Start Your Future Metal Fabrication/Engineering course at Grafton</u> <u>TAFE</u>

Year 10 students Tully Darbin, Jaxson Fulton, Izaac Waghorn and Lachie Doyle have been enjoying participating in the Educational Pathways Program (EPP) Start Your Future Metal Fabrication/Engineering course at Grafton TAFE one day a week. The students commenced this free course in Term 2 and enjoyed it so much that they decided to participate in it again in Term 3! As part of the course, the students have received Cigweld welding gloves and a welding helmet for free and have been welding products themselves which they can take home, including a metal toolbox. The Start Your Future courses get students out of the school setting and into TAFE-style learning. The Metal Fabrication/Engineering course provides students with practical demonstrations from highly qualified teaching staff and the opportunity for students to participate in hands-on activities to gain insight and knowledge in the engineering industry. The course educates students on Workplace safety, How to safely use and maintain tools and equipment, an Introduction into project planning, measuring and cutting metal, and an Introduction to welding. Course outcomes include students making informed career choices to access VET options like SBATs and VET at school or transitioning to study TAFE NSW and students developing individual learning plans identifying courses and study options linked to their preferred careers. Upcoming Start Your Future courses on offer at Grafton TAFE for Term 4 include Automotive, Early Childhood Education and Care, Barbering, and Animal Care.
